

Why study in Botswana?

- The ACM program is centered at the University of Botswana in Gaborone, the nation's capital, largest city, and center of its economic and political life. Gaborone prides itself on being one of the fastest-growing cities in Africa.
- Botswana has emerged as one of the most dynamic economies in Africa. Its government is known for long-range planning, progressive social policies, and significant investment in education.
- Extensive nature preserves in Botswana attract world attention, and the country is becoming a favored ecotourist destination.
- Botswana must deal with many of the social problems confronting African countries, such as rural-to-urban migration, poverty, and high rates of HIV/AIDS infection. However, the government has developed substantial programs for confronting and managing these and other issues.
- Botswana provides both a healthy antidote to the negative characterizations of Africa often found in Western media and a rich array of possible solutions to crises facing developing nations.

Host institution The University of Botswana (UB) in Gaborone. UB is one of the most modern universities in Africa, with excellent facilities. The University attracts outstanding faculty members from throughout Africa.

Dates Spring semester (early January - mid-May)

Courses and credits Recommended credit is 16 semester hours or the equivalent.

- **Setswana** Study of the fundamentals of the national language of Botswana. UB faculty (4 credits)
- **Elective Course** Students select a course offered by the University of Botswana. UB faculty (4 credits)
- **Program Director's Course** Program Director (4 credits)
- **Independent Study Project** A project in the student's area of interest. Program Director or UB faculty (4 credits)

Program Director A faculty member from an ACM college serves as the Program Director, teaching a course and supervising independent study projects.

Field trips Field trips, both local and to other parts of Botswana, are an integral part of the academic program.

Enrollment Maximum of 20 students

Eligibility Seniors, juniors, and second-semester sophomores are eligible.

Language requirement No prerequisites. Except for the required Setswana course, all classes are conducted in English.

Living arrangements Students live in UB dormitories, equipped with cooking facilities, sharing suites with students from Botswana.
